

comes as a "shock"



Irish students excused from school

Special treatment of one ethnic group is declared unfair

Irish students around the country were excused from school on March 17 in order to celebrate St. Patrick's Day holiday. Irish students were

required to have notes from their parents giving them permission to stay home from school and then they were able to enjoy their entire day free from school work and homework and take the day off to celebrate the holiday any way they desired. 

New foreign language elective introduced

"One ring to rule them all, one ring to find them, one ring to bring them all and in the darkness bind them.

This famous poem can be recited by most fans of JRR Tolkien's The Lord of the Rings, and for the first time, students can learn how to utter it in Elvish. In writing his famous trilogy, Tolkien invented not only a fantasy world called Middle-earth but also an entire language, Elvish, which is spoken, not surprisingly, by the Elves in his novels.

According to the West Potomac Course Catalog, Level 1 Elvish will be introduced in time for the 2010-2011 school year, with Levels 2 and 3 being added in the succeeding years if the elective proves to be popular. Students will learn basic grammar, speaking and pronunciation in the course. They will also learn to write in Elvish, a considerable challenge as it does not use the English alphabet. The course will also include a focus on the study of Middle-earth history, complete with geography lessons and excerpts from the books. The popular movies will be screened as a supplement to the lessons.

The elective will be an opportunity for students who are less than thrilled with the prospect of romance languages (French, Spanish, etc.) and would prefer a challenge and an unconventional experience.

"I think it's about time," exclaimed junior Caitlin Moniz, "Elvish is one of the world's fastest-growing languages, and it'll definitely come in handy in the future."

According to the Course Catalog, the language will be taught by one Mr. Baggins. An interview with Baggins revealed a promising future for the course.

Asked if he was worried that Elvish might be overshadowed by the more traditional language electives already offered at our school, Baggins replied assuredly, (while snacking nonchalantly on a loaf of waybread, called lembas by the Elves), "Elvish is one of the fastest-growing languages in the world. Already, over 50 people are fluent within the US alone and at least twice that number in Japan. So, no, I am not worried at all."

Indeed, Elvish as a language saw a major surge in popularity during the early 2000's due in large part to the paramount success of the films starring Ian McKellan and Elijah Wood. According to the Tolkien Society's website, there are "many different dialects of Elvish," all of which



are perfect for conversing "about stars, trees, and death." The two main branches of Elvish, as referenced in Tolkien's works, are Quenya and Sindarin. According to omniglot. com, which provides full Elvish alphabets, Quenya is High-Elvin, while Sindarin is spoken mainly by the Grevelves or Sindar. The Tengwar alphabet, that is Feanorian letters, is used to write in both dialects, as well as the more obscure Westron and Sylvan strains. Quenva will be taught in the course's first semester, and Sindarin, along with dollops of the ancient dialects, will be the focus of the second semester.

With the addition of Elvish as a language elective, it has been speculated that perhaps other languages from fantasy and science-fiction series could be integrated into schools in the near future. Depending upon the success of next year's Elvish experiment, some other new languages could include Wookie, Parseltongue, and gibberish.

Other students have responded to the change with surprising enthusiasm. Senior Alex Butler has become Satterwhite's second-in-command, and the two are often seen whispering furtively about recruiting new Butler stated, "Shock technology is an excellent idea. Now everybody will be forced to come

The community's response to the shock collar security plan remains a mystery, as the school has banned all external contact until the plans are finalized. While one would expect parents to be outraged with such harsh treatment, underground sources report relief on all parental fronts. As one anonymous father stated, "I look forward to this as an opportunity to save all that gas money my kid is wasting driving to Five Guys every day." Only time will tell whether such support will drive the plan into effect, or whether shock-collar security will be crushed under a tidal wave of student

Authorities investigate claims against Sikes

Who knew a teacher at our school could be a Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) agent?

We refuse to accept or deny these allegations, as we must protect the safety of our agents and the citizens of the United States of America."

An investigation is still pending, and Sikes continues to work here in the mean time.

uncovered a startling secret: Mt. Vernon High School outbid West Potomac for our football field. After an infestation of prairie dogs on their field, Mount Vernon had to make a change. The arduous and costly process of relocating the prairie dogs and installing a new burrow-proof AstroTurf field will take months, and graduation is slated for mid-June. Mt. Vernon promptly sought out a new site for graduation, settling on our field for its nearby location, rodent-free grass, and cheap cost. Because they were able to offer twice the price that we planned to use towards graduation, Mt. Vernon successfully gained usage of our football field.

Seniors were less than thrilled with this turn of events. 'I'm still in shock," reported Fagan. "What's magical about a parking lot?"

A preliminary sketch of graduation proceedings revealed that hardly any of the trappings associated with graduation will be present. Due to the timely and arduous task that providing ample seating for the expected thousands-strong crowd would require, the school will provide seating for graduation speakers and faculty only. Additionally, only the valedictorian graduates will receive chair space, though they must haul their own folding chairs. Everyone else will be confined to the standing space at the back of and around the parking lot.

For the same reasons, there will be no podium or platform for the speakers and graduates to use. A recent letter sent to all parents of the 2010 graduates explained, 'It is impossible to guarantee that guests attending the 2010 graduation will actually be able to see and photograph the exact moment in which their child receives the diploma," due to the lack of tiered seating. The school did hire a professional photographer to snap that defining moment, and pictures can be purchased at \$60 for an 8" by 10" size, and \$35 for wallet-sized copies. Framing is an additional fee.

Senior Anthony Kennedy expressed concern over the photographer issue, stating, "My mom already bought a new video camera for graduation, and now she probably won't get the chance to use it.'

Similar woes were echoed by much of the student body. Sophomore Emily Key explained her distress: "This year it's a parking lot, next year it'll be someone's backvard! I'm supposed to graduate in 2012, and who knows if there'll even be a ceremony by then?"

As the event approaches, the administration expects a gradual acceptance to arise. For now though, it is still a major source of disbelief for the class of 2010.

This "business" has been in operation for over ten years and now that the work room secret has been revealed, students wonder how the teachers will



They welcome any newcomers (as long as they have read the Twilight series more than once) and are excited about the upcoming




On Friday, March 19, rapper Lil Wayne performed for the student body during a Black History Month peprally in the main gym.




