

The Cure is a band people across the generations know and love. Supported by lead singer, Robert Smith, The Cure has been around since 1979. They have released 13 studio albums, including two singles albums, Staring At the Sea and Galore. Their new album, Bloodflowers, may be the end of

Bloodflowers is more sentimental than most Cure CD's. It lacks their typical "catchy single." The songs are longer and more melodious. Robert Smith poured himself into the songs, which more closely resemble the Cure single "Catch" than anything else. In an interview with CMI, Smith said, "I just didn't really feel like writing or performing pop songs this time around. I wanted the on 99.1 WHFS and DC 101, is album to have a lot more coherency and more emotional depth... and not have the mood broken by a couple of radiofriendly singles." The album resembles the older Cure albums, Pornography and Disintegration.

The songs on Bloodflowers have a strong focus on the throbbing bass and guitar passages. There are long instrumental introductions before Smith comes in with his low, pensive lyrics. Sustained guitar interludes break the songs into pieces, dragging them out perfectly. Other songs, such as There Is No If," accompany Smith's words with keyboard melodies.

The first radio single for Bloodflowers released in the U.S. was "Maybe Someday."

This single, frequently played one of the lighter tracks on the album. The tempo is more upbeat, with strong guitars and percussion. "Maybe Someday" is one of the shorter songs on the album and, also, the closest to a "pop single." The song released as the single in other countries was "Out Of This World," As the first track on the album, it sets the listener up for a melancholy, somber

To support the album, The Cure is doing The Dream Tour 2000. They will begin this tour in Europe this March after doing several promo shows in the US and Europe. The Cure will return to the United States in late May and early June to do more extensive touring. Commenting on the tour in his CMI interview, Smith reflected on

have become one of the most chaotic morning shows since Howard Stern.



Twenty-One: The Scandal by Allyson Larrick

On September 12, 1956, the game show *Twenty-One* first hit the air waves. It was hosted by Jack Barry, who created the program with Dan Enright. In 1958, a scandal erupted that *Twenty-One* was rigged.

Most contestants on "Twenty-One" were cast as actors. Every question and answer was carefully scripted. They told contestants to mop their brow twice, count to ten, and breathe heavily before they answered the questions. The air conditioning was often turned off in the booths, so the contestants would start to perspire. Contestants were coached on when to take dramatic pauses, how to answer the questions and when to ask for the question to be repeated.

Herbert Stempel, a 29-year-old GI-college student, was a contestant on *Twenty One*. He signed a contract that said if he played along he would get all of the money that he "won." He was an overnight celebrity. His face was seen in magazines and on television. People began to recognize him on the street. He received fan mail, but there was no truth behind his image. The producers chose his clothes and made him cut his hair. They wanted him to come across as a nerdy GI, working his way through college.

After just four minutes on the program, Stempel had "won" over \$9000. He eventually ran his "winnings" up to \$69,500. It was then that he was told he wouldn't get to keep all the money. He had to sign a new contract or leave the show with nothing.

Stempel's new opponent, a man by the name of Charles Van Doren, was going to "beat" Stempel the next night. Stempel answered his \$100,000 question incorrectly, as he was instructed to do, and Van Doren became the new champion. After overhearing rude comments made about him, Stempel decided to go public with the story.

The first person he contacted was Jack O'Brian from "Journal-American." Gradually, tidbits about the alleged scandal came out, but O'Brian was reluctant to come out with any direct accusations.

Mellencamp Gives Music Listeners a Sense of Security

John Mellencamp, formerly known as Johnny Cougar, is an original American bad boy who has captured the enthusiasm of teenagers for more than two decades. Mostly known for his hits such as "Jack and Diane," "Pink Houses," and "Hurt So Good," Mellencamp has released fifteen albums since his first in

John J. Mellencamp was born on October 7, 1951, in Seymour, Indiana. He grew up on a farm and was very close to his family. He started playing in a band when he was in the fifth grade and kept playing guitar throughout high school. After graduating from Vincennes University, Mellencamp worked for a phone company, but was fired and moved to New York in 1975.

Mellencamp recorded the album Chestnut Street Incident and without his knowledge it was released by the MainMan Production Company under the name Johnny Cougar. After severing his relationship with MainMan, Mellencamp returned to Indiana to record more music and escape from the Johnny Cougar image.

In 1980, he recorded his fourth album Nothing Matters and What if it Did. The first single "Ain't Even Done with the Night" only reached #17 on the charts. The album didn't do much better. However, soon after its release, Mellencamp began to work on another album Ameri-



The Best That I Could Do-released in

can Fool. It became the largest selling album of 1982. "For four straight weeks in October, John Mellencamp had the #1 album and two Top 10 singles at the same time, becoming the first person since John Lennon to do so" (mellencamp.com). "Hurt So Good" spent 28 weeks on the chart and "Jack and Diane" was the #1 single in the country. That year Mellencamp received three Grammy nominations and took home best Rock Vocal Performance, Male.

Along with Neil Young and Willie Nelson, Mellencamp held the first FarmAid concert on September 22, 1985 in Champaign, Illinois. During this concert, Mellencamp asked the viewers in the audience to write to their local representatives for action to help American farmers. There have been 14 day-long concerts since the first one. Each is held in a different location with many top vocalists such as Deanna Carter and

Dave Matthews in the lineup. Each vocalist appears at his own expense. FarmAid has raised \$14.5 million for churches, businesses, and agencies that provide food and medical services for struggling farmers. Mellencamp was awarded the President's Merit Award for his work with FarmAid. He received the Nordhoff-Robbins Silver Clef Award for his convolution with music therapy for handicapped children.

While on four in 1992, Mellencamp suffered a mild heart attack. He took it very seriously and canceled some of the tour dates. As he told VH1, "If you live it's a small one, if you die it's a big one." Since this life changing experience, Mellencamp has taken more time to spend with his wife, super model Elaine Irwin, and their two sons. He published a book of paintings in 1998 entitled, Mellencamp, Paintings and Reflections. All of the proceeds go to VH1's Save the Music (an organization setup to save the music programs in elementary schools).

We have watched John Mellencamp transform from a rambunctious teenager, who sang mostly about girls and hanging out on a Saturday night, to a man consumed by two divorces, singing about life's trials and tribulations. His most recent self-entitled album, released in 1998, is a wonderful combination of both. He has settled down and found his place in life. This new sense of self has definitely shown through in his music.

Since he started his career, Mellencamp has been launched into stardom by shows like MTV's Party House and Dick Clark's American

Bandstand, but also by his American working man image. He has been nominated for 11 Grammys and has had 10 Top 10 singles and 7 Top 10 albums. He sees a bright future for our country and vocalizes the end to racism and poverty-stricken farmers. "Ideally I think it'd be nice if all families would have to give birth to a child of another race... that way, in 100 years, there would be no black and white, there would be only shades of black and white" (Rolling Stone, December 30, 1999). With statements like this and lyrics like "Hold on to sixteen as long as you can," "I fight authority, authority always wins," and "I was born in small town...I can breath in a small town...I cannot forget from where it is that I come from, I cannot forget the people that love me," it's no wonder why Americans flock to his music for a sense of good old-fashioned family security.

Emerging From the Ghetto and Forming a Hip-Hop Empire





Master P's New Top-Selling Album turns heads everywhere.

The infamous hip-hop artist, Percy Miller, known to fans as Master P has taken the music world by storm with his recent success. Master P, 29, who was born and raised in New Orleans, Louisiana has been in the public spectrum as a result of his current accomplishments. Master P, has recently appeared in movies, pay-per-view wrestling and tryouts for the NBA's Toronto Raptors. In addition, he has embarked into the sports management industry, with the foundation of No Limit Sports.

However, the road to success for Master P was not exactly paved with gold. He grew up in the third ward Calliope Projects located in the heart of New Orleans. His mother moved to California when he was young, but he stayed and grew up in New Orleans. As he finished high school, his grandfather died and he came into an inheritance of \$10,000 dol-

lars. With that money in his pocket and his music on his mind, Master P moved to California and opened a music store. The store in Richmond, California, was called No Limit Records. While still owning the music store, he decided to venture into the actual art of performing. Eventually, what had started as a small music store and evolved into a record company.

Master P released his first album in 1991, entitled, The Ghetto's Tryin' To Kill Me which sold over 100,000 units after an independent release. After that album, Master P took time off to produce more gansta rap albums for clients, starting a business empire. In an attempt to ignite his career as an artist, Master P released a follow up album, 99 Ways to Die, in 1995. The album went on to sell over 200,000 copies. After the release of 99 Ways to Die, several major record companies offered Master P lucrative deals. In the end, he made the decision to stay with the company he founded, No Limit Records. However, he did join up with Priority Records to increase distribution of No Limit produced albums.


Things gradually began to pick up for No Limit. With the 1996 release, *Ice Cream Man*, which sold over 800,000 copies, Master P had begun to climb the summit of the music industry. Not long after, Master P's associates also started to gain notoriety. These artists included, Silkk the Shocker, C-Murder, Kane & Abel, Mystikal, Mia X, Fiend, and others. In addition, Master P had formed a trio with his brothers, Silkk the Shocker and C-Murder, who called themselves TRU. TRU released their first album in 1995 named *True* which sold over 400,000 albums. The group followed up that record with their next album *Tru 2 Da Game* in 1997 which was a smash hit and sold over 2 million copies.

Entering the latter part of 1997, Master P released his fourth solo rap album. Entitled, Ghetto D, the album signified the peak of Master P's rap career. The album included the hits, "I Miss My Homies", "Let's Get 'Em", "Make "Em Say Ugh", and "Bourbons and Lacs." To date the album has gone platinum several times and still remains popular. The talented Master P, also made an appearance in theaters during 1997.

The hit movie, I Got The Hook Up, was directed by none other than Master P himself.

As 1998 rolled around, Master P released his last solo rap album, Da Last Don. This two disc album, allowed Master P to go out with a bang. Like Ghetto D, Da Last Don has also gone platinum several times. After putting out this record, Master P put more focus on his other interests. These interests include a contract with WCW Wrestling, the dream of playing professional Basketball and of course, No Limit Sports. However, recently, Master P released, Only God Can Judge Me, which was a collaboration involving himself and other artists.

During a majority of 1998, Master P was playing basketball with the CBA, while trying to make it to the NBA. He was trying out with the NBA's Toronto Raptors throughout the month of October, but failed to make the jump into NBA stardom. As for No Limit Sports, the young agency, is in the process of forming a strong client base. The agency has been in the news lately with the signing of



football star Ricky Williams. Williams, the Heisman Trophy winning running back from The University of Texas, is playing for the New Orleans Saints. Aside from their main client, No Limit Sports is negotiating with several potential clients with the aspiration of becoming one of the biggest sports agencies in the country.

So, the future looks bright for Master P and the whole No Limit family. Master P who seems to excel in everything had created a unique and profitable business empire. Junior Meredith Evans said, "I think Master P is awesome because he made his own way through the music business. He emerged [from the ghetto], got his own label and made some incredible gansta rap." In fact, Forbes magazine ranked Master P, 10th on its list of highest-grossing entertainers.

So, with more money in his pockets, and more than just music on his mind, the future holds "no limit", for Master P.

Local 80's Punk Band Still Refuses To Sell Out

They arose from the eighties' hardcore music scene. The four man band that originated in Washington, DC, releasing over seven albums since 1987. They have toured every state in the US as well as England, Spain, Germany, Sweden, Ireland, Holland, Scotland, and Rome, just to name a few :stressing their anti-corporate style, they are Fugazi. Fugazi has probably had the most success that any of the other punk bands formed in the eighties let alone any of the punk bands formed after high school. But they have not let any of the attention go to their head. The only band that could have made it this far in the music business, keeping their promises and motto is Fugazi.

The band is comprised of its four members: Ian MacKaye- vocals and guitar, Guy Picciotto- vocals and guitar, Brendan Canty- drums, and Joe Lallybass. Lead singer Ian MacKaye attended Woodrow Wilson High School and has been in other well known bands such as Minor Threat, Teen Idles, Skewbald and more. The other members had their flings with other bands too, though their names are lesser known. The group does give credit to other bands members such as Pearl Jam singer Eddie Vedder, REM's Michael Stripe, and Thurston More from Sonic Youth, all of whose music has influence Fugazi Fzi in one way or another. To this day Fugazi still will play for free at Ft.Reno park where they got their start, to give back to the community that they grew up in. Fugazi is not shy to local papers either, in 1993 The Washington Post claimed, "Fugazi is the face of punk growing up".

Unlike most bands names, Fugazi can actually be found in a dictionary. The word Fugazi happened to be in a book that Ian was reading right before the group was going to play their fist show together. Nam by Mark Baker, was a novel on veterans reflections of the Vietnam War, while reading Ian was struck

Ian was in. Fugazi proved to be a much better name that just "Ian's new band".

Any person who has attended one of Fugazi's shows has witnessed that the band does not allow moshing and crowd surfing because they don't want to see their fans retire on stretchers. Their negative feelings against moshing arose due to the fact that they fell as if the acts have become more about a "macho image". Concert goers that are the roughest and strongest seem to get the best view only because they push their way up to the front. People should be allowed to enjoy the music. Ian says it

Fugazi's best known song "Waiting Room", and it has been noted that Pear Jam has covered the song "Suggestion".

So what is the deal with Fugazi stressing the fact that they are against outrageous prices and selling out to advertising? Unlike most bands they are not out to drain every cent from their fans pockets. You will never hear of them charging any more that five bucks for a show and never hear of them playing at any place unless all ages are al-



denly enamored of us because our name is on a list in some trade publication. Those people I don't really have much time for because they really don't have time for me. We're not interested. There's nothing the labels can offer us that would be worth the loss of our own music" (Ian).

With all that in mind Ian MacKaye and friend Jeff Nelson started their own record label, Discord Records, in 1980. Dischord Records has been signing to their label local bands since then and to this day has no intention of stopping their business. Ian thinks of the com-



best, "We play loud, electric guitar music, and you'd hope that doesn't mean you have to act like an [explicit]".

You know all those bands who are against people bootlegging their music, well Fugazi doesn't care, some may say they even encourage it, as long as it's free. Guy Picciotto, vocals and guitar, explains that, " [we're] completely into people taping our shows and trading those tapes. We are also basically cool with people posting shows on the Internet as long as it is for free.

Where we draw the line is when people turn our music into a saleable product with out our permission. We feel when we play live that the music is open and available to everyone and were not into people capitalizing off that access".

That may be why Fugazi rejected the opportunity to be the headlining spot at Lollapalooza. Although the major reason was that they felt the ticket prices were extremely too high and they didn't want to be involved with that. Notice you will never see Fugazi on MTV, once again because they just "aren't interested in that kind of advertising", says Ian. However there have been reputable bands that have covered some of Fuagzi's songs, such as The Red Hot Chili Peppers whom have covered

lowed to attend. Ian adds

levity to the subject by clarifying that, "For five bucks we could suck. Because we are human and we do suck sometimes". Now this does not mean that the band is not worth the trip to see, they are actually quite amazing with their eccentric tone. Fugazi played that last show of the season at Ft.Reno park this summer. They played through the rain until lighting became a safety factor half way through and their show had to be cut short. All kinds of people attended, even parents with their children. Many

will agree that the show was worth getting your clothes soaked for, and since it was free to see them perform no one was at a loss.

Above all, the number one thing that Fugazi will never be heard of doing is signing to a major record label. "There are some major labels who are sud-


pany as a big family and would not want to put a stop to any of their bands producing, leaving them with no where else to go. He proclaims that, "[Dischord Records] lends an awful lot of money out to a lot of local labels to help them get stuff done. I think that the label has sort of gotten bigger that itself at this point. So, when I think about stopping the label, it really means it's going to stop an awful lot of things and people. And I have been very, thought about it before I do something like that."

As for their songs and music, not a single word could sum up the both. All one can say is that if you haven't listened to them yet, you have no idea what real punk music is all about.
