

Royal blue and neon orange just do not go together. This was one of the many concerns that raced through students' minds when news of the location for the class of 2011's graduation ceremony broke. Last June, West Potomac drew a date for graduation at the usual venue, the George Mason University (GMU) Patriot Center. That date was June 22nd, which is a Wednesday at the end of the school year. This means seniors would have to attend the final week of school, traditionally a requirement for underclassmen only. This prompted the administration to make a controversial decision at the Parent Teacher Student Association (PTSA) meeting on September 13th: The class of 2011 would be graduating on June 17th, 2011 at Hayfield Secondary School, combining blue and orange.

West Potomac has previously graduated at the GMU Patriot Center for approximately 15 years. Many students believe graduating at a college shows the graduates a place they can aspire to, and gives them a feeling of accomplishment. Also, some seniors believe graduating at a so-called rival high school to be some sort of betrayal to West Potomac, where most have spent four years attending.

In response to the backlash from parents and students, on October 1st, a survey was released on FCPS 24/7 Blackboard giving students the option to vote for a venue. Once tallied, the results supported the administration's prior decision to hold the graduation at Hayfield Secondary School. Out of 213 voters, 63% chose Hayfield over the GMU Patriot Center.

While some students are neutral, others are staunchly opposed to the proposal. Those who are indifferent to the decision are concentrating less on where they are graduating and more on planning for the future. Receiving a diploma is the goal, and where they obtain that vital piece of paper is not as important. Senior Amanda Alves

Breast cancer bracelets banned from schools

Is 'boobies' a dirty word? Some schools seem to think so. Schools from California to Florida have begun banning a pink rubber bracelet about an inch thick bearing the phrase, "I [heart] boobies." Students have been suspended, parents are in an uproar, and the debate

is only becoming more and

more heated. Five years ago, the "Keep a Breast Foundation," a non-profit organization that is dedicated to promoting breast cancer awareness, created these bracelets in an effort to spread their message among teens. However, school officials are taking a different view on the matter. Many call the bracelets insensitive, immature, and most of all "inappropriate." Schools in Arizona, California, Washington State, South

Dakota, and Florida have banned the bracelets, and some have even gone so far as to suspend students for sporting them.

Hunter Cooper, a 15-yearold student at Rocklin High School in California, was asked to remove his "I love boobies" bracelet, which Photo Courtesy of Lauren Metz he wears in honor of his grandmother, deceased a breast cancer victim. He complied, but when school officials attempted

to confiscate the bracelet he refused to hand it over. In a statement to reporters he said, "When I was asked to turn in my bracelet, I took it off, told them I would not wear it and put it in my backpack, [but] they told me to take it out and give it to them. That's when I started to ask questions and told them 'no'." Cooper was then suspended from school,

Low amount of parking spaces anger students

In high school, one of the moments each student dreams of is receiving his or her license and being able to drive to school. It is a rite of passage that gives students a novel feeling of independence and autonomy at long last.

But when unexpected circumstances prevent this from occurring, many students wonder, "What



happens now?" For the first time in years, a surprising event has taken place at our school: the parking passes have sold out.

Parking passes went on sale on September 10th for seniors and September 15th for juniors. To be permitted a parking spot, each student must sign a contract agreeing to the school's policy for cars on campus, complete a form describing his or her car, and pay a \$200 fee. The passes are sold during each lunch period, and the line most always extends out the door. For most students, the wait is worth having the blue and white pass in their hands. They will stand in line for a half an hour or more in order to receive the permit.

Junior Patrick Murphy said, "I waited in line for the entire lunch period in order to get a spot. I didn't even eat lunch!" Many other students had to sacrifice eating lunch in order to receive a pass.

This year, however, students were denied passes—even after braving the long lines. One problem was that the passes were not disbursed in a fair and equitable manner. A student with an early lunch period had a better chance of receiving a permit than a student whose lunch period was later in the day. The major cause of the scarcity of passes, however, was that the junior class consists of over 600 students—a record number—almost half of whom can drive. Consequently, not everyone who wants to pay for a spot is guaranteed one. The parking spaces sold out in four days for the seniors, but in only two days for the juniors. If you were a junior buying your parking pass on the second day, and you had C or D lunch, you were out of luck.


These events are in stark contrast to years past. Last year, spots were available to students throughout the year. Senior Caitlin Corrigan did not receive her license until January of last year and was still able to purchase a space. Responding to the problems she witnessed this year, Corrigan said, "I'm shocked that all the spots are sold out. I applied halfway through the year last year, and there were plenty of passes left!"

Parents have been calling the school 24/7, attempting to ensure their child receives a parking pass. So far they have been unsuccessful. Seemingly caught off guard by the situation, security has offered few solutions. Students



Homework? Check! Pencil? Check! Cute guy sitting next to you? Check! Teacher? Absent! Sophomore Amanda Trenchard walked into her 5th period chemistry class and glanced at the substitute teacher, Mr. Muhammed. It was the second week of school, and she still did not have a chemistry teacher. West Potomac High School went from 2,080 students to 2,200 students. With the influx of students this year, there has been a shortage of teachers and additional students in each class. It was reported that at least one science, two foreign language, and one special education teacher were missing on the first day of school.

While Cliff Hardison and other faculty members struggle to find subs to cover for the classes, Hardison said it will not be long before all the teaching spots are filled. The recommended Spanish teacher has to get his papers translated from Spanish to English, which will take a couple weeks. While waiting for a teacher, students like Trenchard have to make do with learning from busywork. Yet does learning from a packet and a substitute qualify as a class?

Trenchard and her mother were so appalled they even thought of switching her into a different class. While parents hounded the office for answers, some students had different ideas. "It probably won't be detrimental to the students learning because the first few weeks are just a cumulative review," declared

Savannah Bishop, a West Potomac student. However, the former Director of Guidance, Timothy Boyd, explained that as long as the parents get the updated information on the situation, they usually understand.

Yet, a 2007 study by RT Milliner found that "teacher absences may affect student achievement through the creation of discontinuities of instruction, the disruption of the regular routines and the procedures of the classroom (Rundall, 1986; Turbeville, 1987)." He went on to say how even when substitutes give astonishing lessons, they could not have the strategies that long-term teachers would have. Also, it will be difficult for students to make connections with the substitute. Additionally, he went on to state that substitutes probably would not know the subject they were teaching as detailed as the permanent teachers.

Despite the growing concern over this issue, students and parents can rest assured the administration is doing everything in their power to get appropriate teachers.

Mr. Boyd, said there is currently only one Foreign Language teacher missing from the West Potomac staff. He also stressed how important it was that the administration find a teacher quickly, but not to rush and skip important details. In addition, he clarified that multiple West Potomac partitime teachers are being shared with other schools, which complicates the schedules. "We don't want to hire anything but the best," finished Boyd.

School start time hinders students health

"Just one minute longer," high school students exclaim as they roll over to hit the snooze button. We all wish we had more time to sleep on the weekdays, but is it possible that lack of sleep is actually harmful to us?

Recent studies indicate that physical growth and physiological changes going on in the teenage brain make it difficult for a teenager to be productive during the early hours of the morning

Teenagers should be getting nine and a half hours of sleep on a daily basis. Unfortunately, the average teenager gets seven and a half hours with a quarter of the population getting six and a half hours or less. Lack of sleep can affect mood and one's ability to think, perform, and react appropriately. Many teenagers are unable to fall asleep before 11 pm due to the sleep hormone melatonin, which is released at night. This hormone makes it difficult to fall asleep early and even more difficult to wake up early. Over time, lack of sleep can impair metabolism and disrupt hormone levels which helps contribute to obesity.

To compensate for lost sleep, many students turn to caffeine to wake them up in the mornings. While a jolt of caffeine may increase a teenager's alertness, it creates problems with anxiety, headaches, mood, dizziness, and normal sleep patterns. Caffeine consumption is the number one cause of insomnia, a common sleep disorder in which it is difficult to fall or stay asleep. Caffeine intake is also directly related to kidney and urinary tract infections which interrupt the normal sleep cycle and leave you feeling more tired in the mornings.

The recent program SLEEP (Start Later for Excellence in Education Proposal) has led many schools to take action and let high school students sleep more by making the start time 8:30 am. This late start allows students to get more sleep at night, preparing them for the day ahead. "I would like the time to sleep in more, because when seventh period tolls along I am exhausted and when I get home I don't want to have to do work when I'm tired," says senior Ashton Start.

Research indicated that there are many potential advantages to having a later start. For one, the attendance rate naturally increased as

well as the amount of continuous enrollment. In addition, the tardiness rate decreased significantly. Students were more likely to show up on time and more often throughout the school year with the late start and were more aware during their first period classes. With plenty of rest, students were able to function more easily and felt more prepared for early morning exams. Having the ability to wake up later improved the behavior and attitude of the students as well. With more time to sleep, students were well aware of their surroundings in the morning which promoted safer driving. Students are more likely to get in a car accident in the morning because they are not able to pay as much attention as they should to the road. Finally, the extra sleep time allowed more students to participate in activities, and decreased the amount of teen depression. After-school clubs and activities became more populated than ever. Many students reported that they were even beginning to go to bed earlier due to the change.

Unfortunately, a later start for high school would indicate a need for elementary students to start earlier. Most parents would be unable to rearrange their hours at work or find an adequate babysitter to watch their elementary school children while their high school siblings remained at school. While younger children are fully capable of waking up in the morning, they would be left standing at the bus stop in the dark. However, if all students went to school at the same time, there would be a desperate need for buses and not enough money to pay for them. High school students would also be put at a disadvantage because they would have less time to work and participate in team athletics and afterschool activities. Practices would run later and homework assignments would be started even later in the evening, causing students to get the same amount of sleep they normally would without the delayed start. Of course, students also might abuse this opportunity completely and choose to go to bed later.

Overall, while medical research indicates that a later start for school would be most beneficial to teenagers, officials are still trying to balance out the consequences that come with it.





Space Tourism has rocketed to a new level

Moon rocks? No, thanks, I'll take some stardust instead.

The moon is old news. Forty years have passed since man first bounded across the lunar landscape and frankly, it is no longer headline material. Space tourism, that is, ordinary citizens purchasing tickets to travel into space and back, is the next step in exploring outer space.

At least, that is what entrepreneurs like Sir Richard Branson keep claiming Branson is a tycoon best known for founding Virgin Group, an umbrella corporation comprising over 360 companies, including Virgin Mobile. In late 2004, Branson announced the launch of a new space tourism company, Virgin Galactic, which would employ technology developed by American aerospace engineer Burt Rutan and funded by Microsoft cofounder Paul Allen. For the consumer-friendly price of \$200,000, the company offers passengers a ride to 50,000 feet above ground and about six minutes in zero gravity. The Virgin Galactic website promises passengers "that life will never quite be the same again."

Virgin Galactic is just one among a host of other entrepreneurial pursuits involving commercial space travel. Another company that stepped onto the space tourism'scene only recently is Boeing, already a major aerospace and defense corporation that was founded in 1916. Boeing released its own version of a space vacation, a plan which beats "its Russian competitors in price, and its British opponents in distance," according to a September 21, 2010 online article by Mark Brown on the Wired. UK website. Unlike the Russian Soyuz spacecraft which offers passengers a seat alongside astronauts and a flight to the International Space Station (ISS), charging approximately \$45 million a ticket, Boeing stated that their prices would be lower. And in contrast to Virgin Galactic, whose flights merely scrape the periphery of the atmosphere, Boeing plans to travel to the ISS as well. They may begin offering flights as early as 2015.

Space tourism is still a relatively untapped business. At this time, only seven individuals have qualified as "space tourists." In 2001, American multimillionaire Dennis Tito became the first person to claim this title when he spent almost eight days in orbit with the Russian Soyuz fleet and visited the ISS. South African entrepreneur Mark Shuttleworth followed in 2002 and spent 11 days in space aboard a Russian Soyez ship and at the ISS. He paid approximately \$20 million for the voyage. American entrepreneur and scientist Gregory Olsen became the third person to self-fund a trip into space in 2005 when he spent 10 days at the ISS. While in space, he conducted experiments in astronomy and remote sensing; Olsen is also reported to have spent about \$20 million in funding his venture into space. The latest person to earn the moniker of "space tourist" was Canadian Guy Laliberté, the current CEO of Cirque du Soleil. In 2009, Laliberté became the first Canadian private space explorer and his mission in traveling to space was to raise awareness of water issues on Earth. He spent a week and a half in space and, like all previous space tourists, traveled aboard Russian

So what if one cannot afford to spend a quarter of a million or more on a jaunt into space? Never fear, says NASA. Improvements in technology within the next decade or two could bring the price down to a mere \$10,000-\$20,000. And there are always simulators. Space Adventures, Ltd. offers customers a ride on a specially-designed Boeing 727 that "lets you float, flip and soar as if you were in space," according to a September 2010 article in USA Today. For the relatively low price of \$4,950 per person, daredevils can experience zero-gravity weightlessness without ever leaving Earth's atmosphere, thanks to a series of parabolic maneuvers performed by the jets. To some students, these figures are heartening.

"It sounds pretty cool," said senior Ben Aleixo. "I'd probably go for the zero-gravity trip."

Others would prefer to spend the money on something a bit more lasting. Junior Albert Waters would use the cash to buy "a car, or a really nice guitar" rather than taking a brief excursion into space.

The bottom line is that much of the space tourism talk is just that – talk. It is unlikely that people will be living on Mars or dressing like Ziggy Stardust in the near future. Then again, humans have been drawn to the stars since they first looked skyward so it is hard to imagine that the space craze will die out anytime soon.

said, "all I care about is the concept of graduation. I do not really mind graduating at Hayfield, because it is not that big of a deal." Some opinions changed about the proposed location like senior Liliana Alvarez's. "At first, I hated the idea of graduating at another school with all of their colors and their school spirit around us, but now I do not really care about it." These students are impartial about the proposal, unlike those students who are adamant that this is not the right choice for the graduating class. In addition, the seniors whose family members plan to take pictures or video of the pivotal day in their senior's lives do not want their documentation to make it seem as if they were graduating from Hayfield. They do not want the memories of their graduation to be overshadowed by the location.

Alternate locations were considered, but none met the needs of the graduating class. Size and cost were the two main deciding factors. The 2011 senior class is comprised, at last count, of 507 students. In previous years, graduates received 10 tickets for their families to attend the ceremony, a whopping 5,070 ticket tally. Few locations have the capacity to fit all of the guests comfortably, plus the 507 graduates. The locations that could presented a different problem to the faculty.

Most venues that can hold approximately 5, 600 people are quite expensive. For two hours, the George Mason Patriot Center costs about \$13,000-\$14,000. Graduating at Hayfield is free, and enables the administration to lower the senior fee from \$100 to \$75. Twelfth Grade Assistant Principal Alexander Case clarified, "I think moving from GMU is the financially respectful thing to do, given the state of the economy and the fact that some in the community have lost jobs or are tight on money. I personally enjoy the facilities at GMU, but am confident we can make Hayfield our own as a venue."

In any event, the decision has been handed down. Graduation will take place on June 17th at Hayfield Secondary School. In a battle between a wolverine and a hawk, which would win? That remains to be seen.

raising controversy on both sides of the argument. Shaney Jo Darden, co-founder of Keep a Breast Foundation, released a statement after controversy arose saying, "That's the whole idea. It's getting people to talk about breast cancer, its getting people to share their feelings about how this disease has impacted their life... The bracelet is doing what it's meant to do - it's making people talk."

Schools that have banned the bracelets have claimed they are offensive to breast cancer survivors and that the word "boobies" goes against their dress code. Jim Aisenbrey, principal of Baltic High School told USA Today, "I do think there are more proper ways to bring this plight to the attention of people, and I don't think this is a proper way," after he prohibited students from wearing the bracelets at school.

Numerous students at West Potomac are known to sport the bracelets. Junior Melanie Espinoza wears hers proudly and said, "My "I love boobies" bracelet is spreading awareness of breast cancer. There's nothing wrong with it, and I strongly disagree with these schools banning them. Just because it says 'boobies,' should it be considered 'wrong'? I don't think so."

Mary Mathewson, a West Potomac English teacher and breast cancer survivor, wholeheartedly supports the bracelets, "Boobies shouldn't be a forbidden word, especially when it comes to breast cancer. I want my own daughter to be able to say 'I love boobies' without it being looked upon as tactless, because it's not."

Now the question is, where does West Potomac administration stand in the debate over these bracelets? Will the school let students sport these controversial bracelets or will it ban the word "boobies" from the students' attire?

were told to add their names to a waiting list. If a student violates their contract and his or her parking pass is revoked, the next person on the waiting list will receive a permit for that spot. However, the chances of a student losing parking privileges are very slim, nearly eliminating all hope for the students struggling without a place to park

Despite several attempts to question the school security team in charge of parking passes, no one was available for comment. However, Mr. Walls—new this year to the position of Safety and Security Specialist—told a parent that he and his staff are working on freeing up some extra parking spots. For one, paperwork is being checked carefully because some students who do not yet have their licenses

received parking passes. This is in violation of procedure. Mr. Walls is also working with Principal Hardison to reorganize the parking spots, shifting some Academy parking to a different location so that spots will open up behind Springbank. As of yet, however, no new parking permits have been issued.

For students who did not receive spots, times are tough. Junior Emily Hauptle said, "Having to park off campus has made it really hard to get to school. I have to leave earlier so I have time to walk to school. I have to constantly worry about finding a spot, and I get stuck in traffic leaving school."

Students are frustrated and are looking to the administration to start providing some answers.

Underwood is one of the greatest runners to ever come through West Potomac based on the records she already holds here. 



Everyone knows that practice makes perfect, but is there a point where practicing creates more harm than good? All their lives, athletes have been taught that to be the best they can be and more, they must train a lot at a high intensity level. It can lead to irritability, anxiety, insomnia, vision disturbances, weakened immune system, weakened muscles, higher susceptibility to injury and more. For example, sophomore Anna Carney sustained injuries after running two times a day in addition to her daily lacrosse practices. Injuries in sports are very common and should not be taken lightly.

Important things to balance into a workout schedule are enough sleep and a healthy diet. If an athlete refuses to give up the workout hours long enough for their body to recover, try cross-training. Runners should swim some laps at the local recreation center. Athletes who spend all day lifting weights should take the time to go on a bike ride outdoors. This will work different muscles to help make one stronger and give one a change of venue for the workout.



If she continues through high school, Lauren McDonald stands a good chance of setting the record for the longest consecutive member of a high school cheering squad.






33 years, 6 movies, and still more?


anywhere in the room, whether it's in a congested cabinet, or right next to the actual TV.

"[This is] the worst environmental disaster America has ever faced," said President Barrack Obama.

On July 15, 2010, it was officially discovered that approximately 250,000 to 300,000 gallons of crude oil were released into the Gulf of Mexico. The oil was leaked during a deep-sea drilling operation by British Petroleum [BP] Gasoline Company. On April 20, 2010, an explosion left 11 workers dead, and the massive oil leak started. While the leak has created much economic and scenery damage to the coastal communities in the Gulf States, such as Louisiana, it has not inflicted much environmental damage otherwise.

While the oil spill was devastating for both economic and environmental reasons, the media's role in publicizing this event created more drama and hype than actual facts. Many media

outlets compared the BP oil spill to the Exxon-Valdez oil spill of 1989, however the environmental impact of the BP oil spill was not nearly as detrimental as the Exxon oil spill. While the BP oil spill did kill a large number of birds, it only killed around 1% of the animals that the Exxon-Valdez oil spill did over 20 years ago. Many reports of oiled marine mammal carcasses have erupted, despite the fact that the wildlife rescue team has only reported a total of three deaths, according to Time.com. This spill has led to many harsh restrictions on deep-water drilling and fishing where the water may be contaminated. However, all of the fish, shrimp, and other aquatic animals that are heavily fished were tested and found to be healthy and unaffected by the oil spill. There have also been many reports from scientists that this oil spill in particular has caused great environmental damages to many of the coastal towns,

especially in Louisiana. Time.com reported that the oil spill has only destroyed 350 acres compared to the 15,000 acres that are constantly being lost every year to various environmental causes.

Ivor van Heerden, a marine scientist and a former Louisiana State University professor, has been working on controlling the spill. While working on the spill, he found that there is not as much environmental impact as has been reported. He stated to Time.com that "there's just no data to suggest this is an environmental disaster. I have no interest in making BP look good — I think they lied about the size of the spill — but we're not seeing catastrophic impacts. There is a lot of hype, but no evidence to justify it."

Various scientists, news broadcasters, and other people have voiced similar opinions to the public. "If we can contain the flow of oil and keep it out of the ocean, that's not a bad outcome," said Mr. Dudley on CNN's State of the Union to csmonitor.com about the next tactic planned to minimize the oil leakage. When the oil leakage is maintained, then the oil will no longer be a threat to areas around Florida and the East Coast's marine life and water based habitats. Jeremy Short, a retired chemist from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration told usatoday.com that the greatest possible outcome of the oil spill is having the oil float to the surface of the water. "This is just going to float around in a big circle and not hit land," commented Short. "That's a good thing. It will sit in the sun and be hit with wave action," which means the oil collects more water, increasing its viscosity and allowing it to congeal into larger masses, first as "real soft oil mousse and eventually as tar balls."

helps degrade the oil faster compared to colder waters, concluded Arne Jernelöv, a United Nations advisor. There have been many manmade and natural disasters over the years, and many of those have been both over publicized without accurate facts and dramatized. Oil spills and other manmade catastrophes are harmful to both the environment and human population. However, some of the time, the media exaggerates facts in a negative fashion about the catastrophes. While the oil spill has been devastating to both human and marine life, it has not exceeded the impact of the Exxon oil spill over 20 years ago, nor is it as dramatic as it may

back to various studies about water and oil spills. According to a study that was conducted Canadian researchers to determine the affect of the oil spill in 1950 in the Strait of Magellan, they found few ecological disturbances and damages, according to usatoday.com. The researchers mentioned findings of oil that had adhered to the shape of asphalt in the sands of local beaches and estuaries, and found there was a high degradation of oil in the waters. One of the criticisms to this experiment was that the water in the Strait of Magellan was not heavily observed before the oil spill, so the results could possibly be skewed. However, the waters in the Gulf of Mexico are much warmer than that in the Strait of Magellan, which




